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
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

# **Mexican Independence**

Back in the early 1500s, Spain conquered Mexico. This was not a good thing for the

native people, because they were **forced** to work for the Spanish conquerors for nearly 300 years. On the night of September 15<sup>th</sup>, 1810, a priest named Father Miguel Hidalgo y Costilla **started** a revolution against the Spanish rulers. First, he **rang** the bell of his church in Dolores, Hidalgo. A crowd **gathered** and he **told** them to fight for freedom. The next day,the



rebels declared independence from Spain. Mexico finally defeated Spain in 1821.





### Celebrating the dead

Many countries have traditions to remember family members who have died.

# Day of the Dead in Mexico

Day of the Dead is celebrated in Mexico on November 1st. and 2nd. On this holiday, Mexicans remember and honor their deceased loved ones.

The belief behind Day of the Dead is that spirits return to the world of the living for one day of the year to be with their families. It is a festive and colorful holiday celebrating the lives of those who have passed away.

People visit the cemeteries, decorate the graves and spend time there, in the presence of their deceased relatives and family members. They also make altars in their homes to welcome the spirits; these altars can be decorated with flowers, candles, sugar skulls, copal and more elements. The altar can also contain the favorite foods and beverages of the departed, as well as photos and memorabilia.

# Saint Patrick's Day Celebration

1. Read the Story of Saint Patrick's Day and answer the questions.



The day commemorates Saint Patrick and the arrival of Christianity in Ireland, and celebrates the heritage and culture of the Irish in general. Celebrations generally involve public parades and festivals and the wearing of green attire or **shamrocks**.

Saint Patrick's Day, feast day (March 17) of St. Patrick, patron saint of **Ireland**. Born in Roman Britain in the late 4th century, he was kidnapped at the age of 16 and taken to **Ireland** as a slave. He escaped but returned around the year 432 to convert the Irish to Christianity.

"The Irish Americans would wear the green as a reminder that they were nationalists"

"The colors of the Irish flag are **green**, white and orange, the green symbolizing the Irish nationalism, the orange symbolizing the Orangemen of the north and the white symbolizing peace."

Before the end of the 7th century, Patrick had become a legendary figure, and the legends have continued to grow. One of these would be that he drove the **snakes** of Ireland into the sea to their destruction. But the fact is "There are no **snakes** in Ireland for the simple reason they couldn't get there because the climate wasn't favorable for them to be there."

#### The Shamrock

The shamrock, which was also called the "seamroy" by the Celts, was a sacred plant in ancient Ireland because it symbolized the rebirth of spring. By the seventeenth century, the shamrock had become a symbol of emerging Irish nationalism. As the English began to seize Irish land and make laws against the use of the Irish language and the practice of Catholicism, many Irish began to wear the shamrock as a symbol of their pride in their heritage and their displeasure with English rule.



#### The Leprechaun

One icon of the Irish holiday is the Leprechaun. Leprechauns are small Irish fairies who live in the forests. The original Irish name for these figures of folklore is "lobaircin," meaning "small-bodied fellow." Belief in leprechauns probably stems from Celtic belief in fairies, tiny men and women who could use their magical powers to serve good or evil and make shoes and they have lots of gold. Leprechauns have their own holiday on May 13th, but are also celebrated on St. Patrick's, with many dressing up like them.


